# War Fronts Reports More Optimistic

War Front, Nov. 10 .- More optimistic tone prevails according to today's reports from the war fronts, outstanding feature of today's news. Newspaper of British Belgrade front in Passchendaele area where an advance of nearly a mile was made, capturing virtually all the objectives on front, 2500 yards by 10 o'clock in the morning.

The Italians report having succeeded in withdrawing their armies across Piave river after the rearguards were disengaged from the enemy.
