Profit-Sharing Retirement Enrollment Totals 920

President Vance's June 1, 1966 announcement of the adoption of a Profit-Sharing Retirement Plan for hourly wage employees began a series of importand developments for 920 cligible employees. Following the bulletin board announcement and a letter to each employee briefly explaining the Plan, group meetings were held in the Conference Rooms to discuss further details and to answer questions relative to the Plan.

In a nutshell, the Plan enables eligible employees to share in the profits of the Company. There is no cost to employees for participation.

In the beginning, membership in the Plan included employees with at least three full years of continuous service on the effective date, January 1, 1966. Newer employees become eligible on January 1 following completion of three full years of continuous service.

Benefits of the Plan are payable to members upon retirement, upon total and permanent disability, or to their beneficiaries in the event of death. In the case of other terminations of employment, members receive a percentage of benefits based on the number of their full years of membership in the Plan.


