"Keep down the weeds on your property, and while they are young have them destroyed on the vacant lota near you.
If your awnings are old, torm $r$ faded, get new ones.
"Do not spit on the sidewalks. The city is trying to keep those n the business district especialal times each week.

Wherever you find anything unhealthy which you can not remedy, telephone the health department at city hall.
:Sewer connections, garbage cans and ash pits are necessities
for cleanliness at each bome. See that they are provided-kept lean and in good condition."
