The examination for the award of

scholarships from Lancaster County and admission to Freshman Class will be held at the County court house on Friday July 5, at 9 a m. Applicants for scholarships may secure blank ap-plication forms from the county Sup-erintendent of Education. These blanks must be filled out properly and filed with the county Superintendent before the beginning of the examina-tion.
