—Rev. W. A. Fairy was on East Lancaster Circuit assisting Rev. E. M. McKissick in a meeting Monday, and yesterday he left to assist in a meeting at Fort Mill.

—The Victoria, Aragon, and Arcade Cotton mills of this city will close this (Friday) afternoon for seven working days, resuming work August 10th.—Rock Hill Herald.

The annual meeting of the Waxhaw and Shiloh Bible Society was held last Saturday at Waxhaw church. The attend-

Police Raid Restaurant and Find Whiskey and Near-Beer.

Chief of Police McManus and Policeman Bell raided the Clayton restaurant on Main street Friday evening, finding about twelve gallons of liquor and a barrel of near-beer. The stuff was seized and is being held under the Carey-Cothran law. A fine of \$100, was imposed on the proprietor by Mayor Hughes, which was paid. The proprietor claims that only about 16 pints of the whiskey was his, the remainder belonging to other parties, who may make claim for same. He also contends that the beer, owing to the small quantity of alcohol it is said to contain, doesn't come within the provisions of the State law. This question will be settled by the Mayor's having a sample of the beer analyzed. If the test shows the presence of less alcohol than the State limitation, the beer will doubtless be returned to the owner; otherwise, it will be confiscated.

First Contracts Let for Working and Maintaining Public Roads.

The first contracts for road work under the new law were let last Saturday by the board of county commissioners. The roads have been divided into sections of two miles each, and the sections let are as follows:

Sections 1, 2 and 3, on Redfield road, to W. C. Davis, at \$40 per mile.

Sections 6 and 7 on same road, to J. H. W. Weaner, at \$50 and \$75 respectively.

Sec. 11 on Lancaster and Charlotte road, to John A. Kell, at \$37.50 per mile (This section is 3 1/2 miles in length.)

The roads are to be worked according to plans and specifications, which require ditching, crowning, etc. Each contractor will be required to maintain his sections for the period of twelve months.

The road from Lancaster to the Kershaw county line, at Bethel church, will be let in a few days.
