

MONUMENT TO THE WOMEN OF THE CONFEDERACY.

Lancaster Makes Another Contribution to the Fund. The County's Total Donation to Date, \$247.25.

Mr. Chas. D. Jones, president of the First National Bank, received contributions here Friday to the fund being raised in the State to erect a monument in Columbia to the women of the Confederacy, the collections amounting to \$126, which together with contributions previously made here and elsewhere in the county, makes Lancaster county's total donation thus far \$247.25.

Mr. Jones remitted to The State the amount received by him, the receipt thereof being acknowledged in Sunday's issue of that journal, the following accompanying letter also appearing:

To the Editor of The State: I am pleased to inclose herewith our New York draft for \$126, covering collections made by us from citizens of the town and county of Lancaster, as per attached list, in aid of the fund for the erection of a suitable monument to our noble women of the Confederacy.

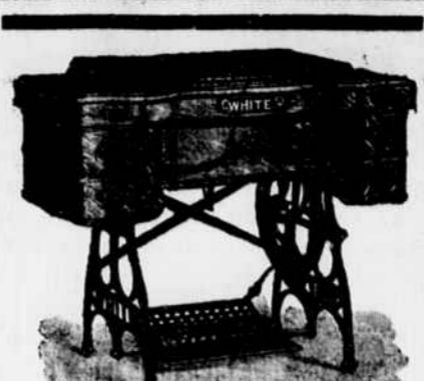
