VOTE ON PROHIBITION IN HOUSE EXPECTED

Nationwide Bill May be Acted Upon in the Next Four or Five Weeks.

Washington, June 10.—Nationwide prohibition will be voted on by the house within four or five weeks, according to predictions made at the capitol tonight after the rules committee had postponed until July 1 action on a special rule to provide for immediate consideration of the proposed Hobson amendment. Members of the committee declared they would consider and probably report the Contrell rule resolution in July.

The committee's action followed a day of stormy conferences between groups of congressmen without reference to political division. It generally was conceded that opponents of the Hobson amendment were forcing the issue, confident the measure could not now poll the two-thirds vote necessary for passage. Representative Hobson himself does not favor action at this time, though he said tonight a vote would be taken the second week in July.

When the committee by a five to four vote deferred consideration of the rule it was announced that this course had been deemed wise because of important matters now before the house for immediate disposition.

Earlier Mr. Hobson submitted a statement to the committee, saying he desired to have his resolution changed in accordance with the amended resolution he introduced yesterday to meet the question of state's rights. The statement said many members of the house had requested him not to press the resolution for consideration until they had time to confer with constituents. He had respected the requests and did not request immediate action.

WILL STACK'S DEATH

Jim Parker Fired Shot Which Sent Stack on Long Journey.

The following from The Wawash Enterprise of Wednesday is a detailed account of the killing of Will Stack, which will supplement the story published in our last issue:

Last Saturday morning about four o'clock Jim Parker shot Will Stack inflicting wounds from which he died in about twenty hours. The shooting occurred in Chesterfield county near the corner where that county touches Lancaster and Union counties about half way between Tradesville, S. C., and Hope in this county.

Parker and Stack had been at outs for some time, and it is said that each had had things to say about the other in days gone by. Parker says that Stack came to his house about nine o'clock Friday night and knocked on his door and that he refused to admit him. A little later he called again without admittance. Then about four in the morning Stack made another call. At this time Parker and his wife were in the kitchen. Stack knocked at the front door a time or two and then came to the kitchen door. When Stack reached the kitchen door Parker stepped to the window with his shotgun and, with the muzzle in about three feet of Stack, fired. The load took effect very low in the back and ranged upward and came out near the pit of the stomach. Parker said Stack fell about ten feet from the steps where a puddle of blood was found and that he got up and ran about fifty yards further and fell again. Later he went 250 yards into the woods and hid, where he remained alone till about nine o'clock Saturday morning.

Stack's people arrived about the middle of the morning and carried him to a nearby outhouse. He remained conscious throughout the day and gave his version of the affair. He said that he rode into Parker's yard during the night—having been lost—to make inquiries about the roads. He got no answer and he went to the door and knocked several times. When he saw a gun barrel coming at him through the window he started to run. When the load struck him he fell but arose and ran about fifty feet further and fell again. Parker started out to shoot him again, but was held by his (Parker's) wife. While this was going on Stack got up and made his way into the woods where he secreted himself behind some bushes. He said that he gave Parker no cause for shooting him. He was unarmed.

Stack was 22 years old and leaves a widow and one child. He first attracted public notice about five years ago when he shot the late Ben Hunter through the face at Tradesville. He was present when Walter Stack killed McManus in 1911. He attracted much attention when he shot up a meeting at Trinity church and was chased by about fifty people into South Carolina, where he was forced to surrender, after his ammunition was exhausted. He was brought back to Union county without requisition papers, but got off easy at Monroe as the witnesses did not appear in full force. A few months ago it is said that he made a store keeper eat six boxes of sardines against his will.

Parker is about 35 years old and is a brother of John Parker, who made himself famous years ago by cutting Willis Moore to pieces with a hawk-bill knife and all the time during the cutting he was saying "walk blady." Jim Parker has the reputation of being a bad and dangerous man somewhat streaked with cowardice. He was arrested Sunday and taken to the Chesterfield jail.

The sentiment is very much in favor of Parker. At Stack's request Sunday the crowd heaped indignities upon his cold body. Pent up feelings broke loose and everybody who had aught against him turned it out freely. One man in the Tradesville section was so overjoyed, so the people say, that he will pay all Parker's expenses in the courts. They also say that some people will sleep better hereafter. Stack was buried at Hopewell Baptist church Sunday evening.
