BOY SCOUT ORGANIZATION.

Local Body to be Called Marion Sims Council.

The necessary steps looking towards a local organization of the Boy Scouts of America were taken at a meeting held Tuesday evening on the court house grounds. The meeting was attended by about thirty representative citizens. Rev. E. T. Hodges was elected temporary chairman. When the purpose of the organization and the good that may be accomplished through it had been discussed by Revs. H. R. Murchison, J. H. Thayer and Messrs. W. T. Gregory, Luther Ellison and C. E. Wessinger, the following officers were unanimously elected: Mr. L. C. Lazenby, president; Mr. J. T. Thomason, secretary; E. C. Croxton, first vice president; John J. Green, second vice president; J. T. Thomason, treasurer; W. R. Thomason, scout commissioner; John H. Poag, scout master; Albert Tinsley, assistant scout master.

Much interest was manifested by the ministers, business and professional men who seem eager to help with this organization which has been found to be so beneficial to growing boys. The individual members of the council were very appreciative of the efforts of Rev. H. R. Murchison, who has been trying to arouse interest in the movement ever since he came to Lancaster, more than two years ago. In token of their appreciation, a rising vote of thanks was given to the popular minister. Thanks also to the other ministers for their interest and assistance was also extended.

Application to the National Association of Boy Scouts at Washington for a charter has been made and as soon as this has been granted the troop of boys will meet and learn just what it means to be a Boy Scout. Boys over twelve years are eligible for membership if they can pass certain required tests. The following "Scout Oath" must also be taken:

"On my honor I will do my best:

"1. To do my duty to God and my country and obey the Scout law.

"2. To help other people at all times.

"3. To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight."

It was decided to call the new organization the Marion Sims Council in memory of Dr. J. Marlen Sims of this county, whose service to others, a cardinal principle of the Boy Scouts, should be an inspiration to every member of the order.

JUDSON CENTENNIAL.

Program for Moriah Baptist Association, Beginning October 4.
