REMARKABLE PRODUCT.

Square of Linoleum on Sidewalk Shows no Wear.

There is a square of linoleum on the cement pavement in front of the Furniture Store of J. F. Mackey & Co., that is attracting a lot of attention and favorable comment.

The square measures about 12 by 12 feet and has been on the sidewalk for nearly a week, subjected to the most severe tests and in all kinds of weather and shows no damage. \$108 From One Acre.

Mr. H. C. Steele of Dyle made one acre of his land yield him \$108 this year. The land was first put in oats and after being proved on by the chickens he got 25 bushels. He then put a part of the lot in sweet potatoes and got 62 bushels. The other part he planted in cane and has just ground out 90 gallons of molasses. In dollars and cents his yields are as follows: 25 bushels oats at 65 cents per bushel, \$16.25; 62 bushels potatoes at 75 cents per bushel, \$46.50; 90 gallons molasses, at 50 cents a gallon, \$45; total \$108.
