DUVAL IS CONDEMNED TO DIE FOR TREASON

Six Other Defendants Sent to Prison For Terms Ranging From Two to Ten Years.

Paris, May 20.—M. Duval, who was director of the suppressed Germanophone newspaper Bonnet Rouge was condemned to death by court-martial for treason.

The six other defendants were sentenced to imprisonment for terms ranging from two to 10 years.

Every decision of the court-martial was voted unanimously. M. Marion, assistant manager of Bonnet Rouge, received 10 years imprisonment at hard labor.

Jacques Landau, a reporter on the newspaper, was given eight years at hard labor.

Goldsby was sentenced to eight years at hard labor and military degradation.

M. Joucla, a reporter on the Bonnet Rouge, was given five years at hard labor.

M. Verasson was sentenced to two years in prison and fined 5,000 francs, with sentence suspended.

Jean Laymarie, for-

the ministry of interior, was given two years and fined 1,000 francs.

Laymarie's condemnation roused greater public interest and discussion than did the death sentence of Duval, as public minds naturally connected his sentence with the forthcoming trial of Louis Malvy, ex-minister of the interior.

AMERICAN SHIP IS SUNK BY A GERMAN TORPEDO

Returning Home Light, With No Soldiers Aboard—All on Board Neches Saved.

Washington, May 20.—The American steamer Neches, a cargo carrier of 7,175 tons, was torpedoed and sunk on the night of May 14 or in the early morning hours of May 15, without loss of life, the navy department has announced.

The vessel was returning home light and with no soldiers aboard. It is believed she carried a cargo of about 125 men.

Secretary Daniels' announcement follows: "The war department is carrying on an investigation of the sinking of the Neches on the night of May 14 or early morning of May 15.

"All on board were reported saved. "The vessel was returning without cargo. "No troops were on board. The Neches was under charter by the United States shipping board.
