be 11 per cent poorer in numbers next year than if the war had never taken place. They will be eight per cent lower in numbers than they were in 1914. Hungary will be still worse off. It will have a population nine per cent lower than before the war and 13 per cent lower than if there had been no war. As the war continues so will these losses increase.
Meanwhile, notwithstanding the losses which England has suffered in the war zone, the British population has been growing. By the middle of 1919 this population will be only three per cent lower than it would have been without war. Great Britain in 1919 will have a larger population than in 1914.
