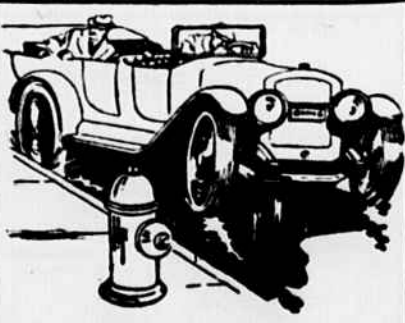
Teaching In Kershaw County. Miss Lillie Usher, of Dixie, has accepted the principalship of the Savannah school in Kershaw county, which opened Monday.
