

Control Measures For Army Worm. County Agent Howell sends The News the following:

The true army worm, outbreaks of which have been found in this county, can be poisoned by spraying crops not intended for forage purposes with lons of water, or with two pounds of nez. arsenate of lead (paste), to 50 gallons of water. In case the spray is A. N. Williamson. used on tender plants like cotton or corn, two pounds of freshly slaked time should be added to the 50 gallons of water to prevent burning.

Where spraying is not practicable. a poisoned bait may be made and used as follows: To 50 pounds of wheat bran and one pound of Paris
