TELEGRAPHIC AND This feeling is growing daily, and throughout the state, all are casting about and preparing to procure homesteads. This feeling is quickened by the ill, and ungenerous GEN. SHERIDAN is removing the vast treatment which the people have received from the planters who have employed, and defrauded, the freedmen this year.

The freedmen are now convinced from their last year's experience in the contract system, that there is nothing to be made, by a continuance of labor another year at the same or even more advantageous wages than those of last year. The manifest determination of the planters seems to be to keep the freedmen in a dependent condition, without The Senate, and House of representatives lands-without the means, of extricating word serfdom is to be the normal condition of the freedmen in the South; if they do not seek homes on the public, domain, or on the shores of Africa.

All through the in upland districts there are bitter complaints that the people who contracted last year, will be almost in a de stitute condition this year, in consequence of the gigantic frauds and in justice done them by the planters. Many complain that after they have faithfully worked the crop till it is ready for harvest, they have been driven from the place and are compelled to suffer hunger in consequence of this treat-

From what we learn from the people there is a determination on the part of large numbers of land owners, not to encourage the sale of lands to the freed people, by any of their neighbors, nor, the hireing or leasing of land to them: this naturally discour. oges the people, and they have concluded to leave the country and community, which manifests so little regard for their, and their children's welfare.
