The following is a correct statement of Cotton raised by Stevens & Cureton, on 1st acres of stubble land, which was manured with 400 pounds of Carolina Fertilizer. The following is the more of cultivation: It was thoroughly broken up twelve inches deep, and laid off in rows three and a half test wide, and the Fertilizer applied in the drill, then hedded on it on the 15th of May, and planted the same day, but owing to the cool and dry weather, did not come up to a stand until about the 1st of June. First working it was run around with a half sho working it was run around with a half sho-vel and partially trimmed out with a hoe. Second working it was run around with a three-inch grub, twelve inches long, and the middles thrown out with a sweep eigh-teen inches wide. 

Dear Sir: In reply to your inquiry concerning my use of the Stono Phosphate in the present year, I will state what I did, and give you the result.

On the 15th of May last I planted tweive seres of cotton, to which I made a heavy application of ectton seed and barnyard manure combined. On the other six, at the time of planting, I put nothing at all, not having received then the Stono Soluble Phosphate.
