The proposition of the Cordage Bagging Company to supply bagging at six and one half cents per yard of 1 and 1-2 pounds, 6 3-4 cents for 1 3-4, 7 1-1 cents for 2 and 7 3-4 cents for 2 1-2 has been accepted.

These are maximum prices and competition may reduce them. It is thought that this means the sale in advance of bagging for at least half the cotton crop.
