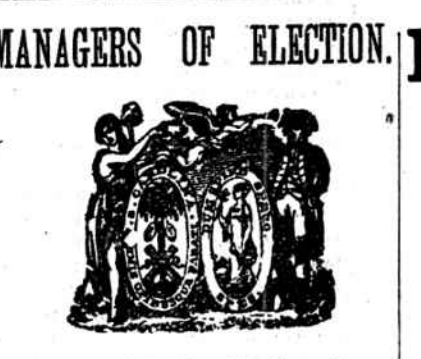

AN ELECTION will be held at the several precincts established by law in Abbeville County on TUESDAY NOVEMBER THE 8th, NEXT, 1892, for the following officers to wit:
