





The Books of Registration will be Opened on the First Monday in December next and kept Open for Three Successiv Days for the Registration of Voters Entitled to Registration unter the Con-

proved the Fifth Day of March, 1896.

THE BOOKS OF REGISTRATION SHALL be opened by the Boards on the first Monday in April, 1896, at the Court House in each County, and kept open for at least six consecutive weeks. They shall be opened again at the Court House on the first Mondays in June, July, August and September, A. D., 1896, and kept open continually for at least one week in each of said months. They shall be closed thirty days before the general election in 1896. After general election in 1896, the Books of Registration shall be opened on the first Monday of each month at the Court House and kept open for three successive days in each month until thirty days before the election in 1896, when they shall be closed until the said general election shall have taken place. The offices and books must be kept open from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until 8 o'clock in the afternoon.

The Board of Registration is the judge of the qualifications o' all applicants for registration up to January 1st, 1898.
