1890.

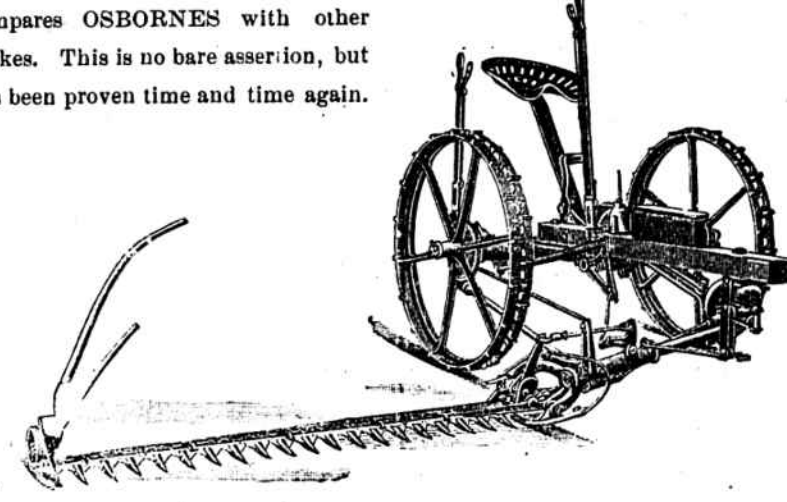
