Begin with only one study. Put yourself to it on history or arithmetic for several days consecutively until you have prepared yourself on the subject in name its court house. question. Then take up another study and so on till you have covered the field.

Study principles. For instance, if your examination is on arithmetic, do not worry yourself with trying to work every example in the book, but rather give yourself to a study of the principles one by one till you can master each one. The probabilities are that you will not get a single one of the principal industries of those the ones that you work, but every one given on examination will be an illustration of some one of the principles that you have studied.
