JAMES PATTERSON TEMPLETON. : Pure in Life-Beautiful in Death-

Triumphing in His Saviour's Love, He Crosses the River.

On the 12th of March, 1886, one home in Abbeville was gladdened by the advent of a little stranger. His name was James Patterson mome bright world he entered that circle to make its home-life all the sweeter by his presence, and by growing up with his growth, to endear himself to all its members and be to them a constant inspiration. For more than fifteen years his mission was charmingly fulfilled. Success rested like a crown on his unconscious effort. The affections of all—mother, father, sisters, brothers—became wreathed around him. He was looked upon by them as the light in their home-window. When the time came for him to leave them—his departure being as mysterious as his coming—the strength, ardor and glow of these affections were made strikingly apparent. Only by the help given from above were they detached one by one, and that little sun beam set irect or eturn to the God who gave it.

Happy was it for him that his earth-lot was ordered where it was, in the bosom of a christian home. Safe guarded by the best of influences from the first to the last, his life grew up like a sweet exoite in a conservatory of flowers. To these influences was he indebted for much that rendered his young life so charming and attractive, and so free from the vices that tarnish the characters of so many. On October 19th of his birth-year this little jewel was dedicated in Baptism to its gracious Donor, and by Him re-entrusted to its parents for a season, by them to be polished and made ready for the Master at His call. On June 23d of the present year he ratified the dedicatory act of his parents by a public profession of Christ as his Saviour. Two months and thirteen days later, on September 6th, 1901, his iaith was put to its supreme and final test in the presence of the Deathriver. The crossing was narrow and soon accomplished—only a week—but the waters were deep. His sufferings were intense, but his faith was intenser. Calmly and trustfully he passed away, beloved by a

charles E. Ward. Charles E. Ward, father of John E. Ward, of this city, died yesterday morning at the county hospital of an affection of the brain, in the 86th year of his age. Mr. Ward was a native of Baltimore, having been born in that city March 18, 1816, and comes of an old English aristocratic family. He was associated with Adams, the express man, when he first established his famous express company. first established his famous express company, and was a man of wealth at the outbreak of the civil war. He espoused the confederate cause and invested his means in bonds of the cause and invested his means in bonds of the new government. At the close of the war, broken and impoverished, he made an effort to recoup his lost fortune, but failed.

The funeral will take place this morning from the chapel of Chapman's undertaking establishment, Rev. J. W. Bachman officiating.—Chattanooga Times.
