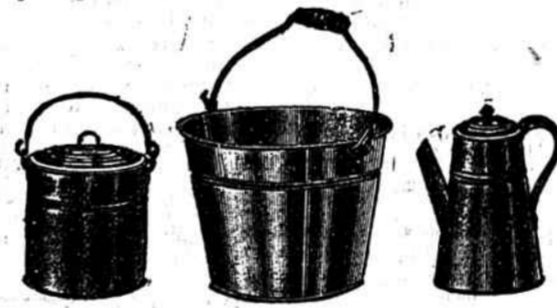

NEW ERA FOR DUE WEST FEMALE COLLEGE.

This old and well known institution is soon to take on new life. It has been the property of private individuals since its organization in 1859. Its founders were moved by a high patriotic and religious purpose. They aimed to provide the best educational advantages for the young women of the South. All these years the college has stood in the front rank. All over the south from Virginia to Texas, even to Arizona and California, and in many states of the north, there are noble women who received their education in this institution. It has done a noble work and its far-seeing public spirited founders are worthy of all honor.

But being a private institution owned by a stock company which annually declared a small dividend, it was not in a position to receive bequests and donations and never asked the church or the public for a contribution to its equipment. The Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church has given \$200,000 or more to Erskine College for the education of her boys and not a cent for the education of her girls.

President James Boyce has constantly urged upon the trustees the importance of making the college a public institution so that it might be placed on an equal footing with Erskine and other schools of its grade. The college certainly has a strong claim on the public on account of the great service it has rendered.

Many of the present stockholders are public-spirited men and women who are willing to sacrifice personal gain for the public welfare. These have agitated the matter until they succeeded in securing the donation of a majority of the stock to the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Synod. A number of these donated all their stock and worked vigorously to persuade others to give theirs. In this list special mention should be made of Prof. P. L. Grier, Rev. O. Y. Bonner, Mr. R. C. Brownlee, Mr. R. S. Galloway, Mr. A. S. Kennedy and Prof. J. L. Pressly.

The Synod at its recent meeting accepted the gift and appointed a judicious committee to purchase the remainder of the stock "at a price not exceeding that of the last market sales." This Committee is composed of the following well known and disinterested gentlemen, Rev. R. M. Stevenson, of Clover, S. C., Rev. J. M. Garrison and Capt. F. Dilling, of Kings Mt., N. C. The trustees appointed by the Synod to hold and control the property are as follows: Prof. P. L. Grier, Rev. O. Y. Bonner, Mr. A. S. Kennedy, Mr. R. C. Brownlee, Prof. E. L. Reid, Mr. R. S. Galloway, Mr. Geo. T. Hagan, Rev. Dr. J. A. Brown, Mr. M. B. Clinkscapes, of Due West, Mr. M. A. Carlisle, Newberry, Capt. W. L. Roddey, Rock Hill, Col. Thos. Hardeman, Louisville, Ga., Dr. Geo. W. Pressly, Charlotte, N. C., L. C. Caldwell, Esq., Statesville, N. C., and Associate Justice Ira B. Jones, of Lancaster, S. C.

This Board was instructed by the Synod to proceed at once to solicit contributions for the erection of a new dormitory building. It is their aim to erect before the first of September next a handsome building with all modern conveniences and accommodations for 150 girls, remove the Schmidt Hall Annex and erect out of the material a dormitory for girls who wish to do their own work and board themselves. The present college building is to be overhauled and transformed into class and music rooms and gymnasium. This will call for some \$50,000 which we hope generous friends of our girls will promptly provide. It is an enterprise which is well worthy of all it asks.

In addition to the above Mr. Boyce wants a Library building, fireproof and arranged for enlargement according to the demand for space; a Science Hall for physical, chemical and biological laboratories with their adjoining class rooms and a room for a Museum; a Music Hall with 500 seats, ample stage, and a pipe organ and 25 practice rooms; and a steam and electric plant for heating and lighting the whole group of buildings.

Mr. Boyce says he will have no difficulty in getting the girls to fill these buildings. Due West is so well known and her standards of education and life so high there will be no difficulty in filling these halls.

There is immortal honor and the profound gratitude of coming generations for those who link their names with these enterprises. It is the opportunity of a life time. May those who have the means appreciate the privilege offered them.

Hints for Orchards.

Make the hens cultivate apples, plums and small fruits. Have yards enough so that hens can be changed from one yard to another, and in that way keep for them a succession of green feed in summer, while they help you to grow the fruit. Sow buckwheat or other grain in the yards when the hens are not using them, for them to gather later. Have small, movable coops or pens for the hens to roost in, and sheltered laying boxes, also movable.—The American Cultivator.
