South Carolina Notes.

The annual convention of the rural letter carriers association of South Carolina is in session in Columbia.

A half witted and inoffensive negro was killed on the roadside at Ord, Chesterfield County. Thaddeus and Steve Williams, also colored, have been arrested and lodged in the Chesterfield jail, charged with the crime.

A movement is on foot in Edgefield County to vote out the dispensary. A mass meeting was held in the town of Edgefield for the purpose of making arrangements to vote on the question.

D. A. T. Farr, a well known citizen of Jonesville, died at his home at that place on Sunday. He was a Confederate veteran. He left an estate valued at \$40,000.

Frank Williams, alias "Old Hump," who was tried in Charleston at the April term of the federal court on the charge of robbing the postoffice at Kingstree, has been convicted for robbing the postoffice at Fort Norfolk and sentenced to five years in the federal prison at Atlanta.

James A. Hendrix, formerly of Columbia, committed suicide at New Castle, Ky., by getting under the wheels of a moving locomotive. It is said that he was short in his accounts with the Bell Telephone Company for which he was collector.

J. N. Austell has been elected chief of the Union police force.

A complete temperance organization has been planned for Union County.

The recent advance in cotton has caused activity in the markets of the state.

The Charleston street car company handled 38,460 passengers on the Fourth.

One negro was killed and another wounded at a celebration at Mars Bluff. The row started over a woman.

The Southern Railway will straighten the curves in its track about Kershaw and a survey has been made.

James Moore a prominent farmer of Donalds, was killed by lightning during a thunderstorm yesterday afternoon.

A meeting has been held and steps taken to call an election on the question of voting out the dispensary in Marlboro County.

While holding a special term of civil court at Bennettsville Judge Watts was suddenly taken ill and had to go to his home at Laurens. Court was adjourned.

Next Monday night Dr. Len G. G. Broughton the noted Atlanta minister will deliver an address at the First Baptist Church in Union.

Resolutions calling for the circulation of petitions for the purpose of calling an election to vote out the dispensary in Saluda were passed amid tumultuous confusion.

Frank Henderson, a negro, was found dead beside the railroad track at Florence. An investigation shows that there is strong grounds for the theory of foul play.

Harry L. Goss severed his connection with the firm of Arthur & Goss at Union and goes to New York, where he takes a position with a large cotton firm.

The city council of Greenville has granted a franchise to the Saluda River Power Company to string wires through Greenville for lightning purposes. The franchise covers a period of forty years.

Henry Mosley is the richest colored man in Greenville. He was recently awarded more than \$8,000 by the Southern Railway for certain lands to be used by the railway company as terminals.

The supreme court has refused a new trial in the case of Palmer Creswell and Fletcher Byrd, convicted of killing Magistrate W. J. Cox of Simpsonville and the men will hang unless the governor intervenes, which is not at all likely.

The trial of S. P. Harvey in Charleston resulted in a disagreement.

A professor of geology in the South Carolina College will be elected July 26.

Robert L. McGee of Greenville was married in Gaffney to Miss Agnes Lipscomb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lipscomb.

A request has been made of the state board of directors to remove J. Cartledge, recently elected dispenser in Columbia, because he is alleged to have been guilty of violation of the dispensary law.

R. D. Robertson of Mayfield, Ky., will establish an ice factory in Rock Hill.

Julia H. Weil of Anderson will open a wholesale day goods house in Columbia.

Commissioner Watson is trying to bring some of the New Jersey silk mills to South Carolina.

T. J. Davenport has been held for trial in Newberry, charged with assault and battery on P. C. Smith.

C. B. Martin of the faculty of Furman University has been awarded the degree of M. A. by Cornell University.

Dispensary Commissioner Tatum has rejected a carload of beer shipped from Savannah on account of having the wrong labels on it, the quality of the beer being of a lower grade than the labels indicated.

R. H. Sonntag of Denmark has been bound over to federal court charged with buying and reselling tobacco tags in violation of the federal statutes.

The American Surety Co. will pay \$2,400 on the bond of Dispenser Buzzard, who was found short at Fort Motte.

The body of a negro who had apparently been dead for several months was found in a swamp near Branchville. E. W. Robertson, president of the National Loan and Exchange Bank of Columbia, has been made a director in the Equitable Life Assurance Society.

C. W. Long and S. L. Fitzpatrick, travelling men saved the life of C. M. Crews, a cotton mill man from Gaffney, who was about to drown in the lake at Chicks Springs Sunday afternoon. They swam out into the pond and rescued him as he was in a death struggle with the water.

Fred B. Spurling, one of those who took the motorboat Gregory across the Atlantic for delivery to Russia, is back and says the Russians refused to believe that the craft crossed the Atlantic.

The condition of John C. Dockery, who was shot by Policeman Rogers in Raleigh Saturday, is not encouraging. Claude Bernard, who was implicated with Dockery in the escape that caused the shooting, has disappeared and nothing is known of his whereabouts.
