at this time in all the mission fields. Memorial services of Rev. R. L. Rowers were held, and the short addresses by ministers and elders, as well as the written memorial, showed the high esteem in which the beloved brother was held by those who were most intimately associated with him in the

Master's service.

Dissolved.—The pastoral relation between Rev. R. C. Ligon and the Smyrna and Morris churches was dissolved on account of his serious afflic-tions, and the Presbytery engaged in special prayer for him and his family, and instructed the moderator to write him a letter of condolence.

Rev. Dr. W. G. W. F. Greeg and Elder W. P. Anderson as trustees to meet with trustees from other Presby-

resbyterial High School.—A Committee consisting of Rev. S. J. Cartledge, Rev. J. C. Shive and Elder M. S. Stribling, was appointed to take into consideration the establishment of a Presbyterial High School for the pre-paration of our boys and girls for College, and report at the next meeting of Presbytery.

By recommendation of the Committee in charge, Mr. S. A. Linly was given the usual appropriation to candidates for the ministry.

churches were granted permission to employ Rev. W. W. Akers, of the Presbytery of Memphis, as stated snpply until the next regular meeting.


