

portion thereof charged sgainst the property or party on the tax books of the City for the fiscal year 1995, shall not be paid on or before the 1st day of January, 1906, the City Treas urer shall proceed to add a penalty of one per cent, on the tax book, and the City Treas urer shall collect the same ; and if the said takes and assessments and penalties are not paid op or before the first day of February next thereafter, an additional penalty of one se centum thereon shall be added by the City Treasurer; and if said taxes, assessments and penalties are not paid on or before th first day of March next thereafter, an addi tional penalty of five per centum thereou shall be added by the City Treasurer and b collected by him ; and if the said taxes, sesessments and penalties are not paid on or before the 15th day of March next thereafter. the said City Treasurer shall issue his tax ex equilon for the said taxes, assessments any panaltics against the property of the default ing tax-payers according to taw.

A commutation road tax will be collected known as "Cannon Place," containing the same time as other taxes of Two Dollars; from all male citizens between the ages of eighteen and fity-five years, except those ex empted by law. Unless said tax is paid on o before the lat day of Jenuary, 1906, six days work upon the public highways and street. of the City will be required under the Street Overseer.

All persons failing or refusing to pay the commutation tax or to work six full days shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than Thirty Dollars or be imprisoned not longer than thirty days. Done and ratified in City Council this 10th






