We notice that some of our esteemed breth ren of the press are urging upon the State and County officers the necessity for enforceing the law in such counties as have voted out the dispensary. This is right, and it is hoped that the officers may stop all illicit sale of liquor. If they show to other counties that they can or do enforce the law, then the anti dispensary people will have a large acce of temperance people to their ranks.

Our observation would lead us to believe that few or no prohibitionists ever do anything themselves toward enforcing the liquo laws. In order to get prohibitory laws they are much in evidence and are vociferous until the law is secured, and then they subside and call upon others for the enforcement They seem to think they have done their whole duty when the law is secured, and they must then urge others, and not them relves, to enforce the law. Did you or any other person ever know a prohibitionist to make the slightest effort to enforce the liquor law? We never did.

The fact that the opponents of the dispen sary are now urging the enforcements of the law is proof that there is, or may be, need for vigorous effort along that line. If such oppo nents of the dispensary were ever clamoron for the enforcement of the restrictions in the sale of liquor we have forgotten the fact.

But whether the opponents of the dispen sary are consistent or not, we hope that they may be successful. If they can have mor temperance and less liquor-drinking, they will prove their superior wisdom.
