A NEW COTTON MILL.
WILL BE BUILT BY JUDGE W. F.
COX AT CALHOUN FALLS.

Will Have 25,000 Spindles and Capital
Stock of \$400,000—Work to
Start at Early Date.

Judge W. F. Cox announced today that he
will at an early date establish a new cotton
mill at Calhoun Falls, in Abbeville
County, at the junction of the Seaboard Air
Line and the Charleston and Western Caro-
lina railroads. Judge Cox has had this in
view for some time, and has recently com-
pleted arrangements looking to that end.

The mill will have a capacity of 25,000
spindles and will besides get a
capital stock of \$400,000. The number of looms
will depend on the class of goods to be man-
ufactured. This has not been determined
as yet. A cotton manufacturer, the Cox Mills in
this city, of which he is president, being one
of the best paying in the state. He will have
a number of subcontractors at and around
Calhoun Falls.

Judge Cox and a syndicate of Anderson
men now are making practically the entire
town. The establishment of the cotton mill
is but one of the many plans that they have
for developing the property.

It is expected that the work of building the
mill will be gotten under way at a very early
date.—Daily Mail.
