





The Eate of State, County, School and Special Tax, Including One Dollar Poll Tax, One Dollar Commutation Tax.
IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ACT TO raise supplies for the facesi year commenc- ing January 1, 1906, notice is hereby given that the office of County Treasurer for Abba- ville County will be open for the collection of taxes for said fiscal year from Monday, Octo- ber 15th, until Monday, December 3ist, with- out penalty. There will be added— A penalty of one per cent on all taxes not paid on January 1st, 1907. A penalty of two per cent on all taxes not paid on Fabruary 1st, 1907. A penalty of seven per cent. on all taxes not paid on March 1st, 1907. Rates Per Cent. of Taxation are as Follows:
State Tax
Total
A poll tax of One Dollar per capita on an male different between the age of 21 and 20 years, except such as are exempt by law, we be collected. A commutation road tax of One Dollar we be collected the same time as other tak from all male citizens between the ages of and 30 years, except such as are exempted law. Unless said tax is paid by first of Mar 1907, eight days work upon the public hit ways will be required under an overseer, it so much be necessary.
Taxes are payable only in gold and sliver Taxes are payable only in gold and sliver coin, United States currency, National Bank Notes and Coupone of State Bonds which be- come payable during the year, 1906. A tax of 50 cents will be collected on each dog. As so few avail themselves of the opportun- tity of paying taxes at the times and places heretofore designated, I will discontinue the appointments over the County, and collect all taxes at the Treasurer's office. Parties desiring information by mail in re- gard to their taxes will please write before December 16th, stating the location of their property, and include postage for reply, and those paying taxes by check must include the charge for collection.
