The Call by Name Nuisance.
From the American Telephone Journal.
Failure on the part of subscribers to give the number in calling for a connection is one of the principal causes of poor service in many small exchanges. The annoyance is petty one, but none the less hard to overcome. A subscriber oftentimes seems to be absolutely determined to refrain from aiding the telephone company according to the expressed wishes of the latter.
The reason for this is not hard to seek. The subscriber is aware that the operator knows the number of the person he desires, and is able to connect him properly without referring to the book. If she will do so, in case of an unknown number a subscriber must himself refer to the book before she can give the call properly. If he calls by name no reference to a list is necessary, time is saved, and what appears to be a nuisance is avoided. He seems to be wholly unable to put himself in the telephone company's place, and forgets the possible state of affairs in a time emergency. Then, with all the subscribers giving names to operators who had no means of associating them with the numbers they give, he hardly be imagined a more certain cause for confusion. Frequently this is experienced with a night operator, to the annoyance of some particular subscriber, who in spite of this cannot be persuaded by the repeated admonitions of the operator to give the number only. He persists in using the names of the persons with whom communication is desired, thus causing delay in the securing of the desired connection as well as confusion to the operator.
To overcome this tendency is more difficult than it ought to be, because many oppose the "calling by number" system as a matter of principle, deriving their false notions from following the course of reasoning just outlined.
