rated in Georgia next year is not the first one. Georgia was really the first prohibition state, or rather colony. While the richest traffic of the Puritans was trading off rum for negroes whom they sold into slavery, prohibition was established by law in the colony founded by Oglethorpe.

The ostensible reason then, as now, was the moral betterment of the people. It is ever so. No sumptuary law, and no law restricting liberty, was ever passed or promulgated without the claim being made that its purpose was to make the people better. 
