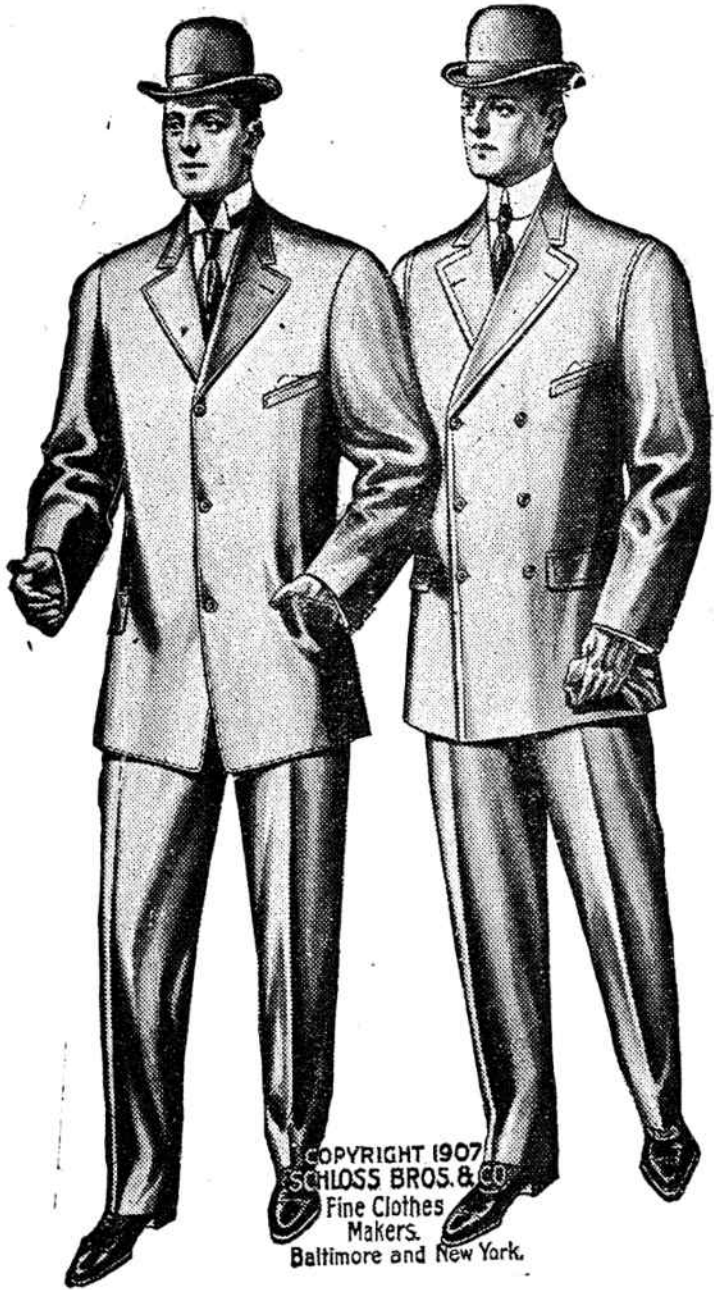

Bids are hereby requested, in accordance with the terms of the Dispensary law now in force, for the following kinds and quantities of liquors, beer and other articles herein enumerated to be furnished to the State of South Carolina Board for Abbeville County, to wit:

- 2 cars Bottled Beer,
 - 1 car Bulk Beer.
- Bids must give prices on bulk beer in carloads and less than carloads. All goods shall be furnished in compliance with and subject to the terms and conditions of the Dispensary Law of 1907, and bidders must observe the following rules:

1. The bids shall be sealed and there shall be no sign or mark upon the envelope indicating the name of the bidder.
2. All bids must be sent by express or registered mail to W. T. Bradley, County Treasurer for Abbeville County, at Abbeville, S. C., on or before 12 o'clock of the 27th day of April, 1908. The contract shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder on each kind, the Board reserving the right to reject any and all bids and any parts of bids. The Board reserves the right to increase or decrease the above quantities at the same price as therein submitted.

OLEMSON'S TROUBLES.

Junior Class Corrects Some Statements.

The newspaper reports of the recent trouble at Clemson College being more or less incorrect and not altogether fair and impartial, we, the undersigned members of the Junior class, desire to give to the people of the State what we conscientiously believe to be a true and impartial statement of the facts. We do not believe that any one knowingly made an incorrect statement; but we do know that some of the newspaper reports were written by men who knew but little about the facts which they attempted to state. Consequently, some blunders and mistakes were made, and we consider it our duty to the people of the State to correct, as far as possible, these mistakes.

Taking up these statements in order, we desire to make the following corrections:

1st. The newspaper articles referred to above stated that several orders and warnings were published at retreat on the evening of March 31st. As a matter of fact, only one order was published, and that called attention to paragraph 12 of "The Regulations for the Government of Cadets." The order in question was as follows:

"Headquarters Corps of Cadets, Clemson College, S. C., March 31, 1908. General Order No. 42.

Par. 1. The attention of the corps of cadets is specially directed to paragraph 12 of "The Regulations for the Government of Cadets," which reads as follows:

"Any cadet who leaves barracks without authority at any time between retreat and reveille, shall be dismissed."

As far as we have been able to find out, no one left barracks without authority during that time. The newspaper reports make it seem that this order was intended for the next day, when the order itself plainly shows that it was not.

2nd. A statement was made that telegrams were sent to Prof. R. H. Fike informing him that his services were no longer needed. R. H. Fike is a cadet and not a professor; and the telegram was sent in a spirit of fun, merely to let Fike know that the participants were carrying on their April Fool celebration! Cadet Fike was in no way connected with the affair.

3rd. The statement that the rest of the students were very indignant over the action of their comrades is a mistake, as practically the whole student body treated the matter as a joke.

4th. Cadet T. S. Allen was not a leader in the celebration. In fact, there were no leaders, everybody acting for himself. Cadet Allen did, after the juniors were dismissed from college, advise the rest of the students to remain at college, but did so solely because he thought that by using his influence, he might help to prevent the lower class men from leaving with the juniors.

5th. There was also a slight mistake made as to the number of students in the Junior class: 45 of these were dismissed and one hundred and thirty were on the list. Of the rest, several were on the list because they had not been persuaded by their classmates not to go.

We do not wish to cast any reflections on any one; our purpose being to correct some statements that might create a wrong impression among the people of the State.

In conclusion, we, the undersigned, wish to say to the people of this and other States that we do not feel the seriousness of the offense and think that the punishment received was just; and that we have absolutely no ill feelings toward the action of the discipline committee of Clemson College. We realize that the mistake was a serious one, but we do not feel that any disgrace attends our dismissal.

This statement is signed by the members of the Junior class dismissed.
