John McGaha Kills Negro.

John McGaha, from near Honea Path, Anderson County, shot and killed a negro Geo. Clinckales late Saturday night, May 9th. The two left Honea Path together in a more or less drunken condition, and went to the house of a negro woman on Mr. A. D. Brantley's place, Abbeville County. They drank more liquor at the woman's house and both became very drunk. At about two o'clock in the morning the negro rose to leave, and he is reported to have said, "Come on Johnnie let's go home." McGaha it is said became offended at the negro's words, and called the negro back. When the negro refused to come back McGaha shot him with a 45 calibre pistol. The negro lived about twelve hours. McGaha has left. The Sheriff C. J. Lyon had expected McGaha to surrender this morning having been informed in a communication over the phone. His surprise was great when he heard that McGaha had gone.
Magistrate Martin of Donalds held the inquest over the body of George Clinckales. It is said that this is the fourth victim of John McGaha's pistol.
