Up until late last night, returns were made only from the following precincts: Abbeville Nos. 1 and 2, Shops, Cotton Mills, Due West, Donalds, Rock Springs, Lebanon, Clatworthy Cross Roads, and Young's School House.

This leaves Wellington, Mt. Carmel, Mountain View, Magnolia, Long Cane, Means Chapel, Level Land, Antreville, Hampton, Keowee, Rock Springs, Lowndesville Nos. 1 and 2.

This leaves half the boxes unheard from. Over half the vote, however, has been polled. This morning no wires could be gotten out of Abbeville.

The Seaboard Railroad wire was not open further than the Shops, and none of the boxes on the other side of Little River have been heard from.

A partial list of the boxes heard from in the County is tabulated above. A full tabulated statement will be published next week.

In the race for Congress Mr. Aiken is in the lead in the County by 972 to 168. Mr. Aiken is in the lead in Greenville and Newberry, with the upper counties to be heard from.

In the race for House of Representatives Mr. Moore Mars was in the lead. It seems that Mr. Mars will be elected on the first ballot.

Mr. Ashley at this time comes second. It will be hard to estimate the vote in the other boxes not heard from, however.

Up to date the prohibition candidates have polled the very same vote, from which we would judge that the prohibitionists are voting pretty solid.

In the race for Auditor Mr. Sondley is ahead by a considerable majority. Sheriff Lyon has defeated Mr. Lawton Robertson by an overwhelming majority.

In the race for Supervisor it seems that the second race will be between Messrs. Schroeder and Stevenson.

Bradley and Chalmers it seems from the vote polled so far, will be in the second race for Treasurer.

Hammond is in the lead for Superintendent of Education with a considerable majority. Some of the boxes not heard from are Hammond boxes and it is safe to say that he is sure of election.

The Coroner's race will be between Bowie and Link. Mr. Hollingsworth is ahead in the race for Magistrate by a small majority.

Gubernatorial Race.

Only about ten counties have been heard from up until this morning. The results so far give Ansel 5,444 and Blease 3,312.

stone 2,128, Lumpkin 400, Martin 373 and Grace the grand total of 36 in the ten counties.

It seems almost certain that Smith will be in the second race as first man. It is hard to tell just now who the other candidate will be.

Cansler from Tirzah is piling up a vote this time. He stands first with 3,281 votes to his credit, followed by Coughman with 1,745 votes.

The race for State Superintendent of Education will be between Elmore and Swearingen, according to the vote heard from. Swearingen is in the lead with something over 4,000 votes, nearly double the other two.

THE SOUTH & WESTERN

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION HAS BEEN RESUMED. Trains Will Probably be Running from Spruce Pine, N. C., to Marion, N. C., by December or January.

L. M. Reid, a native of Hanover county, who has been employed by the South Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio railroad (South and Western) as a division engineer for several years, gave the Richmond Times-Dispatch an interview recently which will be read with interest here.

"Most people have an idea that a railroad running through a mountainous territory winds monotonously around and around the many hills, till the more level country is struck. This is not the case with our road. Wherever we strike a hill to big to cut, we tunnel through, and consequently have a road built on a comparatively tangent with an easy grade through most rugged part of Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and North Carolina. It took money to do it, but the financial backers, as well as the engineers who planned the road weren't afraid of anything, and combined, they tackled one of the most momentous jobs ever undertaken in this country."—Anderson Daily Mail.
