Bids are hereby requested, in accordance with the terms of the Dispensary law now in force, for the following kinds and quantities of liquors, beer and other articles herein enumerated to be furnished to the State of South Carolina for use of the County Dispensary Board for Abbeville County, to wit:

- 200 lbs. corn whiskey, 80 proof.
- 40 lbs. corn whiskey, 100 proof.
- 40 lbs. rye, fine proof and age.
- 5 lbs. 2 stamp rye, 5 to 7 years old.
- 15 lbs. gin, different grades.
- 10 lbs. apple brandy.
- 10 lbs. peach brandy.
- 2 lbs. Tom gin.
- 2 lbs. rum.
- 2 lbs. alcohol.
- 400 lbs. beer.

Bids will also be received for 400 cases case goods, including rye, corn and Scotch whiskey, brandy, gin, rum, wine and beer. Also glass, cork, and tin foil, wire and other articles used for a county dispensary.

All goods shall be furnished in compliance with and subject to the terms and conditions of the Dispensary Law of 1907, and bidders must observe the following rules:
