TRIP TO MT. CARMEL.

Gypsies—Bumble Bee Corn—Prohibition Speeches.

Editor Press and Banner:

Having concluded to take a days outing, a party of three of us from this place, procured a comfortable carriage with a good pair of well matched horses and a careful driver, on last Thursday the 24th inst., and proceeded through the country by way of Calhoun's Mill to Mt. Carmel, returning by the upper route via Island Ford and Warrenton.

We found the crops of both corn and cotton, with here and there an exception where the land is very sandy, better than we had ever seen them at this time of the year—especially the up-land corn.

We passed one field of corn which attracted our special attention, not on account of its superbness, but of its dimutiveness. It was suggested that it might be of the bumble bee variety, as a bee might stand on the ground and suck the pollen from the top-most tassel.

We are not sure who it belongs to, but it is possible that it is our friend P. A. Chatham of this city, as we believe he owns some land in that locality.

Of course, he will disown it. We can only account for it upon the supposition that the owner started out to work it on the Williamson plan, that is to stunt it, and then neglected to unstuff it by a liberal application of nitrate of soda and other fertilizers, as that plan contemplates.

When we reached Mt. Carmel we found that the gypsies had about captured the place, as they were there in great numbers with a perfect caravan of flop-eared mules, spavined horses, women and children and every conceivable style of vehicle.

Noticing a small collection of individuals in and around the school building, we learned, on inquiry, that it had been extensively advertised that there would be a prohibition or anti-dispensary rally in the town on that day; that several prominent prohibition speakers had been invited to deliver addresses, but for some reason or other the expected crowd had not materialized.

Having the day before us we concluded to take in the speeches. So in company with some half dozen others we repaired to the school house where the exercises were to be held and on reaching there found about two dozen others, including a few ladies and children.

The meeting was presided over by that dignified and venerable old gentleman, Col. E. A. Mars, who introduced, as the first speaker the Rev. Mr. Best of McCormick.

The gentleman is a Methodist divine and of course, the greater part of his address was made up of his personal experiences. He told places where he had pursued his calling, among which was the mountain section of this State, where he had spent some three or four years.

We gathered from his address that he did not object to the dispensary per se, but to the quality of the liquors furnished and the high prices at which they were sold by that institution—contrasting the same, in both of these particulars, with that which could be had from the "moonshiners" of the mountains.

The next and only other speaker was the Rev. Dr. Moffatt, President of Erskine College. Dr. Moffatt is a pleasant speaker, and seems to be thoroughly impressed with the belief, that if we could only get rid of the dispensary we would have an ideal state of affairs in this country.

He set out by stating that he would, to some extent, follow the practice of his Methodist brethren, and recite some of his personal experiences. He made the remarkable statement that he never saw a person under the influence of whiskey until he was over fifteen years of age, and then he had to go away some fifteen miles from home to see that one; that this person was a young man who had drunk until he had delirium tremens; that seeing the condition of this young man and hearing his awful utterances and yellings, he resolved then and there that he would ever afterward abstain from strong drink and would fight it with all the ability with which he might be endowed, which resolve he has persistently carried out.

So you see, Mr. Editor, there is still a great deal of truth in that old saying that "it is an ill wind that blows nobody good," for who can tell but that if it had happened that instead of its being this extreme case of the evil consequences of strong drink as exhibited in the case of this young man who saw snakes and a host of other heinous creatures in his delirium, the doctor's first experience had been with some of his fellow-students at Erskine College, who had gone out to Donalds where some of the boys used to go to get a little, and under their return were slightly under the exhilarating effects of what they had procured, the consequences would have been altogether different, and the cause of prohibition been minus one of its staunchest advocates, to say the least of it.

The doctor, like the speaker who preceded him, laid great stress upon the quality of the liquors dispensed from the dispensaries and especially as to the exorbitant prices at which the same was sold.

This struck us as rather a lame argument in favor of prohibition, as undoubtedly the higher the price at which the stuff is sold, the less of it will be drunk. Old Cit.
