### LOCAL PUBLICITY.

Merchant Who Won't Advertise Doesn't Deserve Support, Says a Farmer.

In an audience composed mostly of the members of the Farmers' Union one of the speakers recently expressed the mutual friendship between the farm and newspaper in the following: "As a rule the farmer has no firmer friend than the country press. The home paper is distinctly the farmer's own paper, supported directly and indirectly by farmers, who compose the backbone of the subscription list of the printer and largely for what the enterprising merchant advertises. Now, brother, let us not forget our friends. Let us see that our subscription is paid a year in advance. We can do it."

"The man or the paper that fights my battles shall have my support. Another thing, the merchant advertising are the ones that make it possible for us to get a good local paper. The man of local firm that is too penurious to advertise and help support the local press has no right to the farmer's patronage. "I promise hereafter to go to the local advertiser and the man who does his share in supporting the local press, thus contributing to my support, rather than to buy of a man who proposes to take all and give me nothing back. If farmers as a class would support their friends, the other fellow would soon go out of business.—Florence, Ala., Times.
