## CITY COURTS CAN'T TRY TIGERS.

JUDGE ALDRICH RENDERS FAR-REACHING DECISION.

### Handicap Authorities.

Ruling, if Sustained by Supreme Court, May Cripple Policeman in Fighting Liquor Sellers.

Anderson, Sept. 25.—An appeal case from the mayor's court involving an important question of jurisdiction was decided before Judge Aldrich in the sessions court today. The appeal was from a decision of the mayor imposing a fine of \$100 or 30 days for selling whisky. Appellant's counsel took the position that the mayor's court had no jurisdiction to try a defendant charged with violation of dispensary law, the mayor had only concurrent jurisdiction with the magistrate and that as the statutes gave a magistrate no jurisdiction to try such cases the mayor was bound also by the same statutory limitation. The general statutes give the mayor of the city the same powers as a magistrate, and it was argued by counsel for the defense that a city council could not extend by ordinance the jurisdiction defined by the legislature.

The decision of Judge Aldrich, in case it is sustained by the supreme court, will be of the most far-reaching consequence. It might seriously hamper the enforcement of the liquor law in every town and city in the State. All that the police department of a city could do would be to make arrests and have a warrant issued by the magistrate. The magistrate would then, if upon a preliminary hearing the evidence warranted it, send the case up to the sessions court for trial.

The decision has attracted a great deal of interest here. The city will appeal to the supreme court, and a decision of that tribunal will be awaited with general interest over the State.

JACKSONVILLE CONTRACTORS TO COMPLETE THE BUILDING.

## May Be In Five Months.

The U. S. F. and G. Co., the Bonding Company, Gives W. T. Hadlow Job of Completing the Contract.

The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company of Baltimore, which contracted the bond for Mr. Fred Minshall in his contract with the government to build the new Federal building here, has let the contract for the completion of the work to a large firm of contractors in Jacksonville, Fla., Messrs. W. T. Hadlow and Company who will begin work at once with a large force of hands.

Mr. Hadlow was here this week and made the final arrangements with Mr. Fanning of Washington, D. C., who has been here for several weeks. Mr. Hadlow stated while here that he thought it possible that the building could be completed in five months. The contract, so far as the government is concerned, remains in Mr. Minshall's name. Messrs. Hadlow and company are simply to carry out the contract. The amount to be paid will be the same as that under the first award to Mr. Minshall.

The time for the completion of the building has been extended to the first of August, 1910.
