OFFICE WILL BE OPEN FROM FRIDAY, OCTOBER 15TH, UNTIL FRIDAY, DECEMBER 31ST, 1915.

The Rate of State, County, School and Special Tax, Including One Dollar Poll Tax, One Dollar Commutation Tax.

In accordance with an Act to raise supplies for the fiscal year commencing January 1 1915, notice is hereby given that the office of County Treasurer for Abbeville County will be open for the collection of taxes for said fiscal year from Friday, October 15th, until Friday, December 31st, without penalty. There will be added—

A penalty of one per cent. on all taxes not paid on January 1st, 1916.  
A penalty of two per cent. on all taxes not paid on February 1st, 1916.  
A penalty of seven per cent. on all taxes not paid on March 1st, 1916.

A poll tax of One Dollar per capita on all male citizens between the age of 21 and 60 years, except such as are exempt by law, will be collected.

A commutation road tax of One Dollar will be collected the same time as other taxes from all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 58 years, except such as are exempted by law. Unless said tax is paid by first of March, 1916, eight days work upon the public highways, will be required under an overseer, if so much be necessary.

Taxes are payable only in gold and silver coin, United States currency, National Bank Notes and Coupons of State Bonds which become payable during the year 1915. A tax of 50 cents will be collected on each dog.

**BILLION BUSHEL WHEAT  
CROP, SAYS U. S.**

Washington, Oct. 7.—For the first time in its history, the United States this year produced a billion bushels of wheat.

The Crop Reporting Board, Department of Agriculture, to-day estimated that this year's crop, based on October 1 indication, would total 1,002,029,000 bushels. Last year's output was 891,000,000 bushels. The estimated spring wheat production on October 1 overran the report forecast by 23,000,000 bushels, sending the total production more than the billion bushel mark.

Record crops also were assured in oats and barley. With an estimated outturn of 1,517,000 bushels, the oats crop overran the September forecast by 109,000,000 bushels and surpassed any previous crop. The barley crop is 237,000,000 bushels.

**FLASHLIGHT EXPLOSION  
CREATES NEAR PANIC**

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 11.—The explosion of an over-charged photographer's flashlight caused a near-panic in the midst of the dedication exercises for Wake County's new \$250,000 courthouse this afternoon. Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels was speaking when the flashlight was set off. The explosion was so loud that the large crowd was amazed. There was no damage, but the smoke was very dense for some time.

Secretary Daniels commended the county for its enterprise.

**WARNING TO FARMERS.**

To the Farmers of South Carolina:

I desire to call to your attention a matter that, to my mind, is of grave concern to every citizen of our State.

The boll weevil has reached the Atlanta district, in Georgia. The agricultural committee of the board of trustees of Clemson college, at a meeting held September 29 and 30, has considered the alarming aspects of this matter, and has taken steps to bring this situation to the attention of our farmers so that they can at once prepare for this disaster when it strikes us. The government maps and reports show that the boll weevil has advanced between 90 and 100 miles towards us this season. They have another month or more in which to advance still further in our direction. I am not an alarmist, but together with the other trustees of Clemson college, I do regard the situation as so serious that active steps should be taken at once in order to meet this threatened calamity, and plans are now being formulated by the Clemson college board looking to this end. I will, at a later date, give these plans and suggestions to the public. In the meantime let me urge our farmers throughout the State to sow wheat, oats, rye, clovers and other winter crops, in preparation for money crops other than cotton, to be grown next year.

I urge our people also to fix their minds on plans for raising hogs, cattle and other live stock. I urge this matter most seriously, and assure them that I will advise only what I know to be facts. The increased price of cotton and the spread of the boll weevil, still further reducing the yield of cotton, will have a tendency to attract our farmers to the raising of cotton in preference to other crops, and to fix their efforts on an increase in cotton acreage. This, in my judgment, will mean disaster. I say it advisedly. Again, I urge that everything points to the appearance of the boll weevil in South Carolina within a much shorter time than previous calculations would indicate, and it behooves us as sensible people to give this matter our best thought and to prepare for it accordingly. We must not regard it as one of those misfortunes which may or may not come to us in a distant future. We believe that the boll weevil will soon be here.

Again, I urge upon our people to plant food crops and raise more live

stock. I hope that this warning will be heeded.

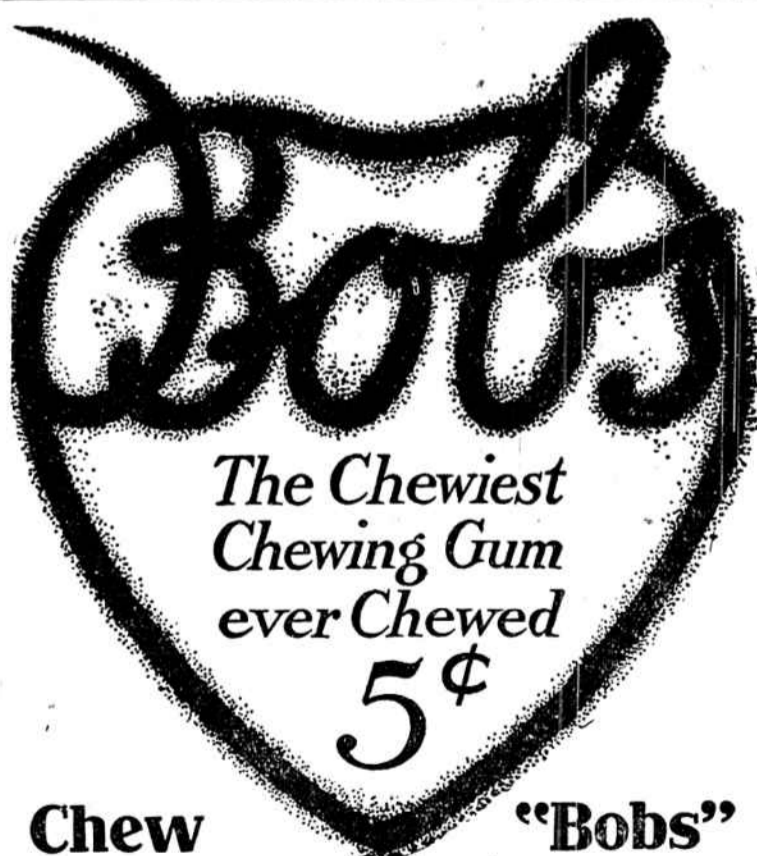
