Washington, November 8 .- The United States in its latest note to Great Britain, made public here today, covering exhaustively British interference with American trade since the beginning of the European war, dclares that the so-called blockade instituted by the allies against and of Messrs George and Charley enemy countries on March 11, is "'ineffective, illegal and indefensible." Declaring the United States "unhesitatingly assumes the task of championing the integrity of neutral rights, the note proclaims that the American government will devote Its energies to the task, exercising always an impartial attitude.

The note, nearly 15,000 words in length, was made public by agreement between the state department and the British Foreign office.
