

# DEMANDS MADE OF JOHN BULL

## BLOCKADE OF ALLIES DECLARED ILLEGAL BY THE UNITED STATES.

Washington, November 8.—The United States in its latest note to Great Britain, made public here today, covering exhaustively British interference with American trade since the beginning of the European war, declares that the so-called blockade instituted by the allies against enemy countries on March 11, is "ineffective, illegal and indefensible." Notice is served that the American government cannot submit to the curtailment of its natural rights, and it cannot "with complacency suffer further subordination of its rights and interests."

Ambassador Page, to whom the note was sent by special messenger, for delivery to the London foreign office, was instructed by Secretary Lansing "to impress most earnestly upon the British government that the United States "must insist that the relations between it and his majesty's government be governed, not by a policy of expediency but by those established rules of international conduct to which Great Britain in the past has held the United States to account when the latter nation was a belligerent engaged in a struggle for national existence."

Declaring the United States "unhesitatingly assumes the task of championing the integrity of neutral rights, the note proclaims that the American government will devote its energies to the task, exercising always an impartial attitude."

The note, nearly 15,000 words in length, was made public by agreement between the state department and the British Foreign office. It carries with it a voluminous appendix, giving the text of American naval instructions issued in 1862 and a summary and table showing hundreds of vessels detained by British authorities since the beginning of the present war.

The body of the note is divided into 35 points, dealing with all phases of

the contraband question, seizures and detentions, prior to, as well as after, the so-called blockade was instituted, and announces that a separate communication will be sent soon dealing particularly with the "propriety and right of the British government to include in their list of contraband of war certain articles which have been so included."

### DEATH OF MRS. WARDLAW.

Mrs. Nannie White Wardlaw died on Tuesday night, 8th inst. at the home of her niece, Mrs. A. M. Smith. She was about 70 years of age. Mrs. Wardlaw was a daughter of Mr. John White, a pioneer merchant and business man of Abbeville. She was a sister of the late Capt. L. W. White, and of Messrs George and Charley White of this city.

She married Mr. Andrew Wardlaw, but he died many years ago. She had no children.

For many years she taught private schools in the city and a great many of the younger people of the city attended these schools at one time or another.

She was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church. Her funeral services be held in that church this morning at 11 o'clock, conducted by her pastor, Rev. H. W. Pratt, after which she will be laid to rest in Long Cane cemetery along with her people of three generations.

### EAGLE KILLED IN COUNTY

A negro man, living on the plantation of Mrs. J. A. Harris, at Little Mountain, killed an eagle on the mountain Saturday. He brought it to town and exhibited it to a large number of people. It measured seven feet from tip to tip of its wings. Another eagle was killed in Greenville county last week.

### TWO SUBMARINES SINK BIG BRITISH STEAMER

London, Nov. 8.—The British steamship, Tara, 6,322 tons, has been attacked and sunk in the Eastern Mediterranean by two German submarines the Admiralty announced today. Thirty-four members of the Tara's crew are missing.

The Tara hailed from Glasgow and was owned by the British India Steam Navigation Company. She was built in 1902.
