SEEK COMMUTATION FOR N. C. WOMAN

Raleigh, N. C., March 15.—Ida Ball Warren, the first woman sentenced to be electrocuted in North Carolina and her companion in crime Samuel Preston Christy, both white, under death sentence for the murder in Forsyth county of the woman's husband, G. J. Warren, are being brought tonight from the jail in Winston Salem to be delivered to the State's prison.

This is by direct order of Governor Craig, for the law is that prisoners sentenced to death shall be in the State's prison twenty days prior to the date set for execution, which in this case was March 3, the governor stating today that unless the prisoners were delivered at once he would investigate the cause of delay.

Gov. Craig is being appealed to for commutation of the woman's sentence because of her sex and there is to be a hearing in the matter on the twentieth of this month, the date now set for the electrocution being March 31. Mrs. Warren and Christy lost on appeal to the State Supreme Court and on application for writ of error to the United States supreme court refused by Chief Justice White.

SNAKES IN ABBEVILLE COUNTY

TIMELY SUGGESTIONS FOR MARCH GRAIN

Clemson College, March 20.—All unfertilized, poor-land grain should be lightly top dressed early in March with nitrate of soda at the rate of 40 to 60 lbs. per acre. When grain begins to "boot" or joint a second application should be made. The early application causes grain to stool or put on a vigorous growth. The second application aids more in the formation of a heavier grain crop.

Fall fertilized grain need not be top-dressed with nitrate of soda until it begins to "boot."

Top dressings of stable manure or cotton seed meal should be made as soon as possible and should be thoroughly harrowed into the soil. Applications of this character should have been made before March.

Harrow all grain crops with drag.

HOW TO HANDLE WINTER COVER CROPS

Clemson College, March 20.—Advice as to spring handling of cover crops should vary to suit conditions.

The farmer who has large acreage of Abruzzi rye as a cover crop to handle with a limited horse power, would do well to begin at once to disk and turn the rankest growth where early plantings are to be made. Plant the area turned each week. This allows a greater growth on the remainder, yet keeps his teams and labor busy and gets more nearly the maximum benefits from the cover crop.

Those who have ample teams, tools and labor might delay beginning preparations until a heavier growth is obtained, especially if the area is not large. Rye should be thoroughly disked both ways before turning and should never be allowed to get beyond the stage of bunching for head, before disking.

Clover and vetch should be turned after disking, when they begin to bloom. Turned while tender and green they are easily cut to pieces by disking and are soon decayed giving up the plant food they contain for use by the following crop.

Never turn a cover crop, which is to be followed by a cultivated crop, without first thoroughly disking both ways, otherwise failure may be expected of the following crop in several particulars which space here does not permit enumerating.

DUE WEST'S ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

So Due West is to have electric lights. This quaint and thoroughly unique community refused to have a railway in years gone by because of the unlovely noise of the locomotives. It is the one place in the world where the Sabbath has been kept in accordance with the strict requirements of the old covenants. Even Sunday dinners are cooked Saturday and served cold on Sabbath, but they are always good, wholesome, enjoyable dinners. And such a feast after an hour spent in memorizing Psalms and catechism. Due West is known to the occasional travelers on the Columbia and Greenville road as "The Holy City," having been thus dubbed by the lamented Cap'n Billy Smith, who never failed in calling stations to say at Donalds, "Change cars for Due West, the holy city, that little train over there doesn't run on Sundays, but goes to Sabbath School."

For be it known that in recent years the enterprising citizens of Due West have built a railroad to connect their town with Donalds, a distance of four miles away. And in the charter of the road, granted by the State of South Carolina, it is stipulated positively that no train shall ever be operated over that line on the Sabbath.

To one who has revisited Due West after an absence of some years, it seems a sacrilege, this puffing and covorting of that miniature locomotive, in the very confines of the quiet hamlet, the soul center of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian church, a substantial, virile, dependable people.


And we see that the town is to have electric lights. The wonder is that such a contrivance would be tolerated there. Is not this an invention of evil? It was reported in the Piedmont that the Duke interests tried to buy the railway for a connection for their interurban electric lines. Not a thing in this world doing. The Due West people will not give up control of their railway, for sooner or later it might mean trains on the Sabbath.

The question now arises, will there be electric lights on Sunday, beg pardon, on the Sabbath?
