AN ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to preserve the health and welfare of the citizens of the City of Abbeville by requiring all dealers in any article of food to keep the same protected and screened from dust, flies and insects.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Abbeville and by au-

thority of the same:
1st. That after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell or offer for sale any meat, fruit, bread or any article of food or drink unless the same has been_continuously protected from dust, flies, or insects or dirt of any kind from the time that it came into the person's control until the sale is

2nd. All meat and fruit dealers shall keep their fruits or meats within the doors of their places of business while it is being offered for sale, except during such time as is necessary in conveying it from the slaughter houses or places of purchase, or railway station, to their places of business, and while any meat is be-ing hauled in wagons or other conveyances to the meat markets or offered for sale from any conveyance or wagon it shall be carefully covered with a clean cloth and completely protected from dust, insects and any and all filth of any kind whatsoever.

3rd. Any person who handles any other articles of food such as bread, fruits, ice cream, ice cream cones, candy, etc., shall keep the same screened so as to prevent insects, especially flies, from coming in contact with the same and it shall be unlaw-ful for any person to offer for sale or sell any such article when such a sell any such article when such a person has knowledge or under the circumstances should have knowledge that it has been exposed to flies, insects or dust.

Any person or persons or corpora-tion, violating any of the sections of this ordinance shall be punished up-on conviction thereof by imprison-ment for not less than 1 day nor more than thirty days; or by being required to pay a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than one hundone dollar nor more than one hund-
