#### WINTHROP COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP AND ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

The examination for the award of vacant scholarships in Winthrop College and for the admission of new students will be held at the County Court House on Friday, July 5, at 9 A. M., and also on Saturday, July 6, at 9 A. M., for those who wish to make up by examinations additional units required for full admission to the Freshman Class of this institution. The examination on Saturday, July 6, will be used only for making admission units. The scholarships will be awarded upon the examination held on Friday, July 5. Applicants must not be less than sixteen years of age. When scholarships are vacant after July 5 they will be awarded to those making the highest average at this examination, provided they meet the conditions governing the award. Applicants for scholarships should write to President Johnson for scholarship examination blanks. These blanks, properly filled out by the applicant, should be filed with President Johnson by July 1st. Scholarships are worth \$100 and free tuition. The next session will open September 18, 1918. #### COAL SAVING THAT COUNTS.

With the passing of the winter months the coal shortage loses much of its terror, but the vigil over the coal pile should not be relaxed, and every economy should be continued through the summer to prevent a recurrence of this season's famine. It is estimated that the shortage of coal for every day of the ensuing year amounts to two and one-half pounds for every man, woman and child in the United States. Possibilities of economies by factories and railroads are receiving the most exacting studies, but more attention is needed for the small savings which can be made in each home. These savings can be made to set free thousands of tons of coal for essential industries and for the navy and the many ships needed to carry men and supplies to France.

Heating is not the only home use for coal. Most gas and electricity come from coal, and decreased consumption of either means a proportionate saving in coal. Only the most economical light bulbs should be used, and these should be of as low candle power or wattage as is permissible. All gas fixtures should be in the best condition, and Welsbach mantles substituted for the open flame burners. The flat flame burner uses more than twice as much gas as a mantle burner, and gives much less light. Every mantle burner substituted for a flat flame burner saves coal every day.

These substitutes in light may in many cases provide better illumination with a smaller consumption of gas or electricity. All lights should be turned off when not absolutely needed. Savings in gas and coal can be made in the kitchen by arranging the cooking so that the stoves are heated for the shortest possible time each day and by a more general use of fireless cookers.

Coal is a military essential, and every ounce saved will help.—Dumont Magazine.

#### WAR SAVINGS DAY.

Charleston, S. C., May 21.—Sec-

retary McAadoo has authorized the following statement:

"It is essential that the American people economize and save in order to make available to their Government the money indispensably needed for the war and to realize supplies and labor required for the production of things necessary for our own military forces and for the military forces of the nations associated with us. One of the best methods of bringing about this result is for everyone to pledge himself to economize and save and to purchase, at definite periods, a specific amount of War Savings Stamps thus giving concrete evidence of his support of the practice of War Savings.

To achieve this object, there will be conducted, under the direction of the Treasury Department, a campaign for pledges, culminating on

June 28th, when loyal Americans throughout the country will be asked to commit themselves to this program.

The progress of the war demands constant and increasing sacrifices. We are sending our young manhood to represent us on foreign battlefields, where they are called upon to sacrifice not only their personal comfort and material interests but their lives as well. It is appropriate, therefore, for the American people who are privileged to remain in safety and comfort at home to consider their sacred obligation to support our gallant men and to pledge themselves earnestly to save and economize in order that our soldiers and sailors may have the food and clothing and the arms and ammunition without which they cannot fight.

To this end that the intensive

campaign may be most effective: I earnestly bespeak the co-operation of all the organizations and institutions of the nation which, through their influence and active support, can further this work. It is desirable that the attention of the entire people centered on their obligation to pledge the Government this kind of support for the winning of the war, and with this object in view, that June 28th, 1918, be observed as national War Savings Day.

With adequate preparation for a National War Savings Day on June 28th, I am sure that the American people will be glad to participate and to pledge themselves to become war savers, thereby giving concrete evidence of their devotion to their country's welfare and of their inflexible urpos to fight until a triumphant victory for liberty is secured.
