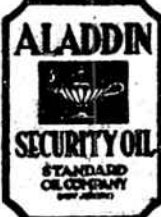

WHEAT MILLING RULES FOR FARMERS OF SOUTH CAROLINA

The wheat mills in South Carolina must observe the following rules which become effective immediately:

1: Mills must not grind for farmers more than enough wheat to supply the farmers themselves and members of their household and their tenants with enough flour from the date of the grinding to October 1, 1918. In estimating how much flour to grind for a farmer from his wheat, millers may base their estimate on allowing twelve pounds of flour per person per month for each member of the farmer's household or tenant.

2: Until the new rules in regard to wheat substitutes are enacted, wheat mills must not deliver any flour to farmers unless they sign the pledge card agreeing to use one pound of flour substitutes for every pound of flour used.

3. Rule 26-D in circular of the Milling Division is modified to the extent stated above.
