WHEAT MILLING RULES FOR

The wheat mills in South Carolina must observe the following rules which become effective immediately:

1: Mills must not grind for farmers more than enough wheat to supply the farmers themselves and members of their household their tenants with enough flour from Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Kay spent the date of the grinding to October flour to grind for a farmer from Mrs. Jessie Boyd was shopping his wheat, millers may base their estimate on allowing twelve pounds of flour per person per month for each member of the farmer's household or tenant.
