

KEEP LIVE-STOCK OFF RAILROAD RIGHT-OF-WAY

Annual Loss Approximately \$60,000.00—Representatives For County Appointed.

The Press and Banner is in receipt of the following with a request for publication:

The loss of livestock killed on railroad rights of way is excessive in the South, being double per mile the loss in the West and triple the loss in the Northeast.

In ordinary times this would be a matter between the individual stock owners and the railroads. Now, however, it is of national import, and forms no small part of our State's Food Conservation program.

The South Carolina Council of Defense, aided by the Food Administration, with the cooperation of the railroads, has undertaken the important task of cutting in half the inexcusable large losses in South Carolina.

We have mailed to all stock claimants an appeal to shut their stock away from the railroad tracks. We have also appointed special volunteer stock agents at every railway town and city in South Carolina.

This question is being answered vigorously in the affirmative at the State Headquarters of the United War Work Campaign, where optimistic telegrams and promises of hard work are coming in from over all the state.

"The \$1,250,000 quota of South Carolina simply must be raised, said

State Chairman W. D. Melton Saturday, "and I am confident that there will no slackening anywhere in the state from Monday morning until the last necessary dollar is subscribed.

"With the statewide influenza quarantine lifted, there is nothing standing in the way of the drive's complete success and there could be no excuse for failure.

"Every one of the eleven campaign districts in South Carolina stands a chance to win a trophy. The first district over the top and the first county in that district will win a handsome flag trophy.

"The state has two chances to win everlasting honor in this drive. The first state in the southwest which subscribes its quota will receive a state flag for doing so, and the first ten states in the nation will have welfare huts in Europe named after them.

"But more important than trophies, more important at this time than anything else, is our great pressing duty to see that the gallant boys across the seas are properly cared for during the period when they will be policing parts of Germany and rebuilding northern France and Belgium. When the heroes come home, God pity and shame the state or county or school district or person who shall be numbered among the slackers in this drive."

Columbia, Nov. 8.—The War Industries Board has worked out with the shoe manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers a plan whereby shoes are grouped in four classes and are to be retailed at prices which have been assigned to each class with the approval of the War Industries Board. An important part of this plan is that each retail shoe dealer shall sign a pledge to the War Industries Board that he will conform to the plan and prices as approved, and then be furnished with a window display card, stating that he is selling shoes on the basis approved by the government.

The State Council of Defense has been asked by the War Industries Board to take charge of carrying out the plan. The first step will be to ascertain the number of retail

shoe dealers in South Carolina either exclusively or partly, and the county councils will perform this service, as well as thereafter to secure pledges from the dealers in shoes and to distribute the window cards.

This is regarded as important by the War Industries Board.

58 JEWISH WORKERS GOING "OVER THERE"

Col. Barker Bids Godspeed to the Graduates of Training School.

The whole-souled co-operation between the seven great organizations working for the happiness and welfare of our soldiers and sailors was recently illustrated at the graduation exercises of the tenth class of the Jewish Welfare Board's Training School in New York. Col. William S. Barker, who went to France representing the Salvation Army with the first contingent of our troops and has been "over there" fifteen months, was the principal speaker and wished the fifty-eight Jewish workers of the class Godspeed, while Louis Marshall, the prominent Jewish attorney and philanthropist of New York, lauded the work of the Salvation Army among the boys at the front.

"What our fighting boys need is inspiration and heart and character in those who are there to help them," declared Col. Barker. "You will represent in the camps and overseas the ideals and standards of the Jewish faith, and it is up to you above all things to be consistent in your religious practices. Practice what you preach. That, I am sure, has been the secret of our own success. If you live up to the principles of your faith and give what you have to give from a heart full of love, the boys will respect you, whether they be Protestant, Catholic or Jew."

The newly graduated field workers will make a total of 260 men doing field work in our camps and naval training stations under the auspices of the Jewish Welfare Board. The Board has about fifty "huts" in the various camps and maintains centers in all large cities where soldiers and sailors of all faiths are welcomed. A headquarters has recently been established in Paris, and 100 men are being recruited here for overseas work. There are now nearly 125,000 Jews serving in the army and navy.
