INFLUENZA CASES DECREASED

Washington, Dec. 26.—Although influenza still prevails in virtually every army camp, a report today by the surgeon general showed a decline in the number of cases for the week ending December 18, as compared with the preceding week. Total cases were 3,630, a decrease of 426 cases.

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CONCERNING AGRICULTURAL LIME.

Clemson College, S. C., Dec. 17.—The Extension Service of Clemson College has received notice from the War Service Committee on Lime announcing that all limitations upon the production and sale of lime or crushed or pulverized limestone in any form for agricultural purposes are removed.

This order restores the sale of lime for agricultural purposes to a normal basis so that it may now be purchased without the necessity of complying with previous directions issued by State Directors of Extension. Agricultural lime has now therefore been recognized to the extent of being classified under the after-war programme among the commodities first to receive a favorable consideration by the Government. This results in authorization for its unlimited use in the maintenance and improvement of soil fertility and the increased production of crops.

Mr. George Attaway, marshal of Calhoun Falls, S. C., was killed Friday morning between eight and nine

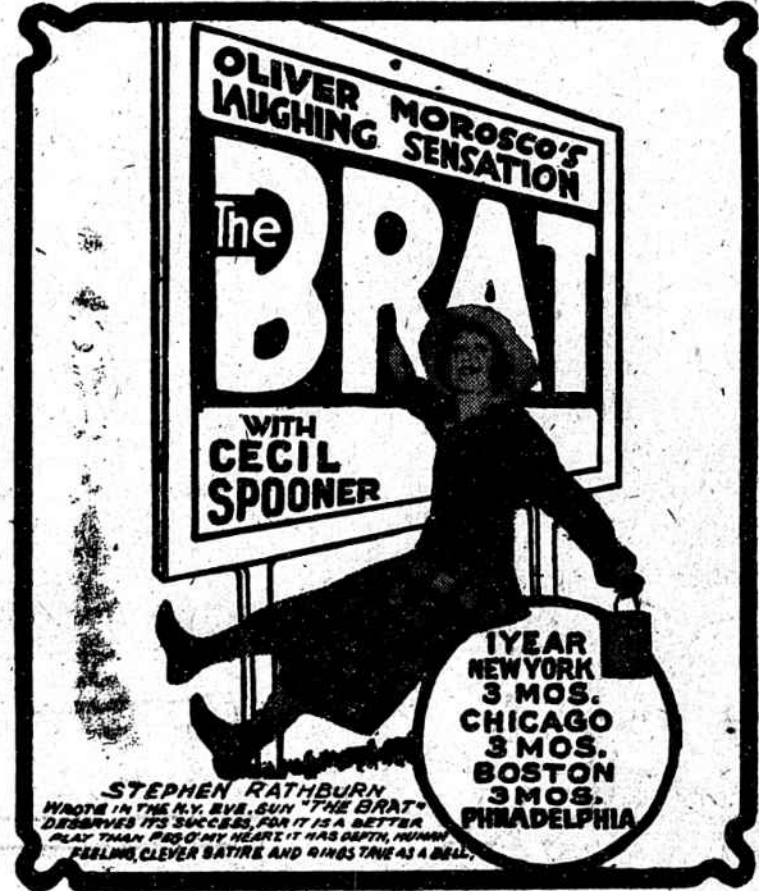
