TO WED FRENCH GIRL.

The announcement of the engagement of Capt. George Benet of the United States army medical corps to a charming French girl, Mlle. Madeleine Volpert of Wimereux, will be received in Columbia. Captain Benet's old home, as one of the most interesting bits of personal news which has come from overseas in some time. Captain Benet is now on duty as a surgeon in one of the American hospitals in London and the date of his marriage will depend in large measure upon the execution of certain legal formalities which are required by the French government. The American bridegroom must furnish to the French authorities no less than five certificates signed by the governor of South Carolina and the mayor of the city of Columbia. These have been executed by Cap-

tain Benet's brother, Christie Benet of the Columbia bar, and sent by him to the French consul general in New York, who will have them translated into French and forwarded to the proper authorities in France.

Mademoiselle Volpert is the daughter of a distinguished major in the French army who was wounded and captured by the Germans at Mulhouse in 1914 and was confined in a German prison from that time until the signing of the armistice. The romance, which is to have its happy consummation in the near future, began at the time of Captain Benet's first service abroad when, as a member of a Harvard unit, he was on duty at the American ambulance hospital at Neuilly. A young woman of high social position, of culture especially in music, and of exceptional beauty, to judge by photographs which Captain Benet has sent to his family here, this bride from southern France will be cordially welcomed by

Captain Benet's family and friends in this country and it will be especially gratifying to Columbians to know that the young couple expect to make Columbia their home. Probably they will come to this city to settle next fall.—The State.

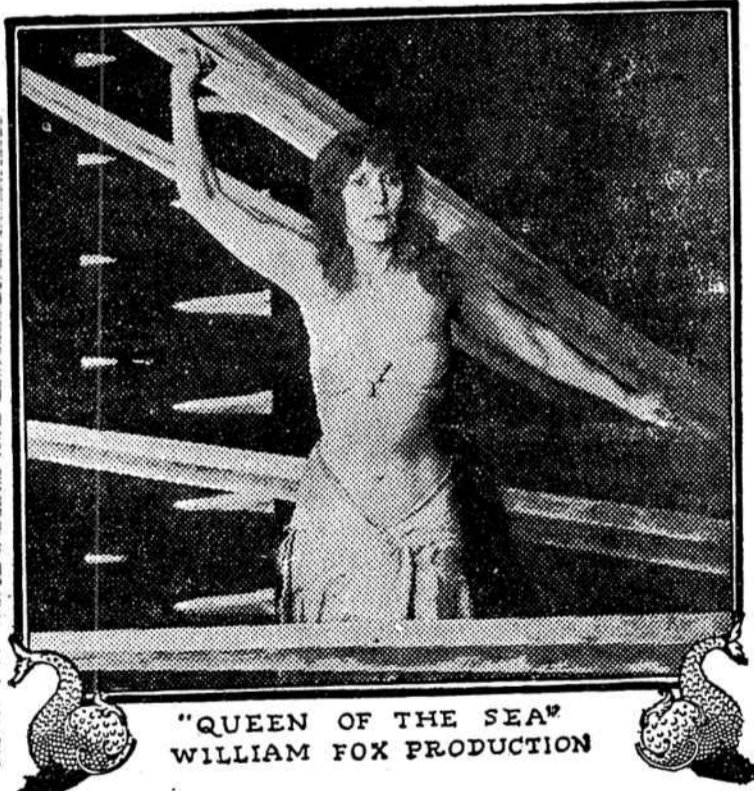
