ANOTHER VETERAN HAS PASSED AWAY

Mr. W. H. McCombs died Tuesday Morning—Funeral at 11 O'clock Wednesday.

Mr. W. H. McCombs died at his home on Grace street this (Tuesday) morning at 8 o'clock after a long illness. The funeral services will be conducted at Edgewood Cemetery Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock.

Mr. McCombs was a gallant soldier in the War Between the States which he entered as a youth. He was a native of Abbeville county, but had made his home in Greenwood a number of years. Unassuming in manners, he was a good citizen and had many friends.

He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. C. E. Dukes, of Greenwood, and Mrs. E. V. Hinton, of Callison, and four sons, Messrs. Tom, Robert, and Milton, of Greenwood, and Joe, of Irmo. The late supervisor, J. B. McCombs was also a son.—Index-Journal.

Mr. McCombs married a daughter of the late Benj. H. Eakin, of the Gilgal section. He was well and favorably known by many of the older people of the county who will greatly regret to hear of his death.

WILL REDUCE POSTAGE.

The high cost of writing letters and sending post-cards will take a tumble the first of July, according to the announcement made recently at the postoffice where it was stated that commencing with that date the first-class postage will be reduced from three cents to two cents and the two cent stamps will be sold at one cent. The increase in the postage rate was made shortly after the United States entered the war against Germany. The government realized from this increased rate in postage about eight million dollars which was used for war expenditures.
