ORGANIZATION AT WORK TO PREVENT REDUCTION

Fight Being Waged to Prevent the Reduction of Cotton Acreage in State Says Chairman Wannamaker.

In a statement issued recently J. Skottowe Wannamaker, chairman of the South Carolina Cotton Association, declares that he "has been furnished with quite a number of letters which show beyond the shadow of a doubt that the work for the reduction of cotton acreage and holding of cotton for the remunerative prices is being systematically fought."

The statement by Mr. Wannamaker continues: "Contents of some of these letters would indeed be a surprise to the general public. For the present it has been decided to hold these letters for further developments."

"I now have in my possession several copies of letters that were written to Governor Allen by parties from this State, also copies of letters that have been written to prominent citizens in practically every section of the cotton belt. These letters prove beyond a shadow of doubt that an absolute, systematic organization is now at work for the purpose. If possible of injuring the campaign for acreage reduction, and the holding of cotton for remunerative prices. Indications are well backed and investigators are securing evidence for the purpose of ascertaining the power behind this movement. We are already in possession of names of some of the men who are systematically carrying on this campaign."

"The contents of some of the letters received, by the association show that some men who have been living on the blood of the South for many years are becoming desperate over the prospective reduction in acreage and that they are preparing to go any lengths for the purpose of defeating this movement."

"The fact that the movement is being opposed in this manner is proof of the fact that it is making wonderful progress."

Mr. Wannamaker, who is also president of the State Bankers' Association, said that he was receiving letters that indicated that the proposition of the organization of the foreign marketing, exporting and financing corporation with a capital stock of one or two million dollars will receive the backing of the bankers, farmers, merchants and business men not only in South Carolina but in every section of the belt. Many of the larger cities have already pledged their quotas, he said.

"Some of the larger banks are urging that the banks take their full quota of the stock of the corporation so that it can be organized without delay," says Mr. Wannamaker, "and that they dispose of this stock to the farmers, merchants, bankers and business men, giving the farmers the preference in the purchase of the stock."

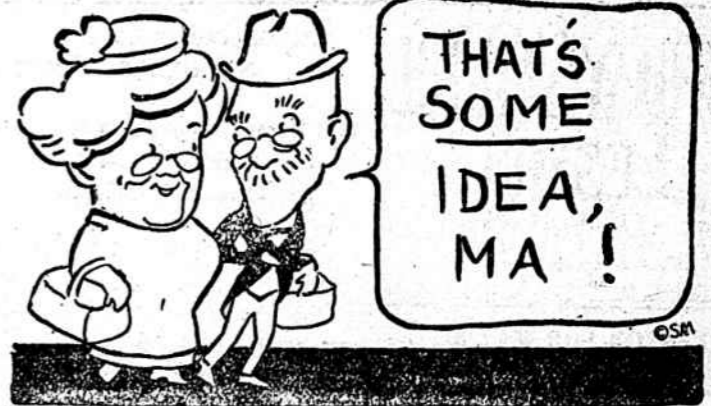
